LEADERSHIP MESSAGEREFLECTING ON A YEAR OF GROWTH AND LOOKING AHEAD

As we reflect on a year of growth, resilience, and collaboration, the Durham Rape Crisis Centre (DRCC) extends heartfelt gratitude to all of our supporters. Our success is deeply rooted in the unwavering support of our community partners, donors, funders, volunteers, and staff, as well as the courage of the survivors we serve. Over the past year we have remained true to our mission to ensure that every survivor of sexual violence and gender-based violence, including intimate partner violence, and sex trafficking, is respected and supported on their healing journey. Our vision continues to be one of an inclusive and safe community service where every individual has the right to safely heal and have an empowered healing journey.

Despite the challenges faced over the past year, including increased demand for our services, longer waitlists for free community programs from our counsellors and more traffic on our crisis line, as well as unfortunate reductions in grant funding and donations, we have made significant strides in strengthening our support network. We have rehired a group counsellor, established a partnership with Ontario Tech University and Red Barn and Delta Pickering Bingos, strengthened our partnerships with Trent University, and enhanced our 24/7 crisis line to serve Sarnia and North Bay Sister Centres in addition to Kawartha Region.

Looking to the future, we are hopeful for the coming year despite political and economic changes. We enjoyed celebrating the invaluable contributions of our dedicated staff, funders, and volunteers at our 50th Anniversary Celebration in May, which is Sexual Violence Awareness Month, and strengthening our ongoing relationships with Mayor Roy of Whitby and MPP Jennifer French and other community members. We anticipate that our annual Take Back The Night March event, which serves as a powerful reminder of our ongoing dedication to supporting survivors, will continue to grow and garner increased awareness. We are also continuing discussions to change our organizational branding to more accurately reflect the diverse experiences of survivors. This is all part of our collaborative strategic plan created for 2025-2030 which includes many priorities from enhancing service delivery to continued diversification of funding and revenue to support the increased costs and demands on service delivery.

We deeply appreciate the collective commitment of our community in helping to create a future where all survivors of sexual violence are met with respect, support, and hope. Together, we are making a meaningful and lasting difference in the lives of survivors. On behalf of the Board of Directors, staff team, volunteers, supporters and survivors we extend our sincere gratitude to each of you for your continued support.




FINANCIALS

In the 2024/2025 fiscal year, the Durham Rape Crisis Centre experienced a \$31K shortfall, primarily due to an increase in the competitive nature of grants and donations and higher costs associated with purchased services, such as professional fees. We experienced reduced funding from some of our community partners, who are also experienced a reduction of funding.


